## JULY Backscatter 2018

**190 Years Ago:** The first U.S. hotel to install bathrooms was the Tremont House, Boston, Mass., for which the cornerstone was laid on July 4.

**67 Years Ago:** The invention of the junction transistor was announced by Dr. William Shockley in Murray Hill, N.J. This new type of transistor overcame the problems of the earlier point-contact transistor. A three-layer sandwich, the outer layers were semiconductors with too many electrons (known as N-type) and the inner layer was the opposite with too few (known as P-type). They weren't up to the point-contact transistor's ability to handle signals that fluctuated extremely rapidly, but in every other way they were superior. They were much more efficient, used very little power, and generated so much less electrical noise they could handle weaker signals than the type-A transistors ever could.

**40 Years Ago:** We're coordinated! Despite initial misgivings, the Ohio Area Repeater Council (OARC) approves our use of 147.81/.21

The ARRL approves of LCARA too. We become an affiliated club, and have remained one ever since, also becoming a Special Service Club years later.

LCARA provides communications for the News Herald's Johnnycake Jog.

**35 Years Ago:** The FCC drops the requirement for logging of all QSO's, including 3<sup>rd</sup> party traffic. Accordingly, the autopatch procedure is changed so it is no longer necessary to identify both parties at the end of a patch.

**30 Years Ago:** 1<sup>st</sup> readings are held for Arlene Patterson KB8DUC, and Jim Capps W8AEB.

**25 Years Ago:** A Florida ham is fined \$50,000, jailed for 60 days, and loses his license for sending false maydays. He could have been fined \$250,000.

N8ZZZ is issued. Future Tech & General calls will come from the Novice call block, starting with KB8P--


